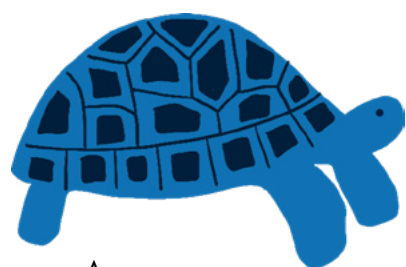

# Bark rubbings

Notice all the different textures of tree bark by making a colourful rubbing.



**1** Find a tree (the bumpier the better).

**2** Place the paper against the trunk and rub the crayon over the paper to make a print of the bark pattern.

**3** Try another tree and see how the rubbings compare.



## Did you know?

Tree bark protects the inside of trees. As trees get older, their bark gets more knobbly and cracked, providing hidey holes for little creatures to live in.
